8 Ways To Stay Warm During Frigid Winter Weather

Below-zero weather across the country already has claimed 11 lives, according to news reports.

1. **Protect Your Skin** - At temperatures of 15 degrees to 30 degrees below, exposed skin can get frostbitten in minutes.
2. **Limit Outside Exposure** - Try not to stay outside for more than 20 minutes. Wear a hat that comes down over the ears and protect the face and neck. In addition, mittens and gloves provide hand protection.
3. **Dress in Layers** - When outside, wear layers to protect against heat loss and wetness.
4. **Seek Medical Attention for Frostbite** - If you think you may have suffered frostbite, do not thaw using hot water or a heating pad. Use lukewarm

water or your own body heat to thaw and seek medical attention.

5. **Keep Your House Warm -**

Frigid weather can pose special risks to older people. Set the thermostat to at least 68 degrees. Also, make sure feet are kept warm.

6. **Protect Against Falls -**

Freezing temperatures means ice, and below-zero weather could spell trouble if sidewalks and driveways aren't cleared. Some regions say to use salt, However, our sub zero temperatures reduces the effectiveness of the salt and can attract moose to your driveway.

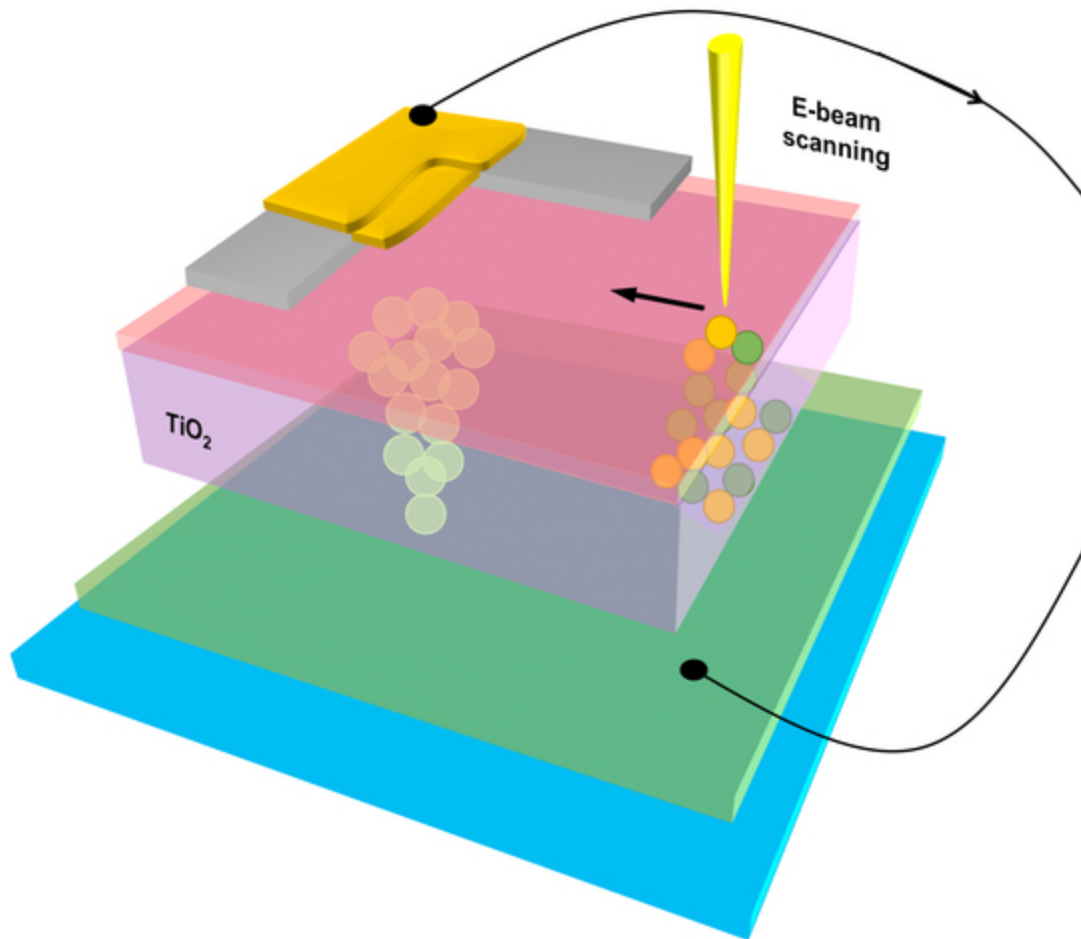
7. **Check On Elderly**

Neighbors - Check on elderly neighbors or relatives to be sure they're warm and safe. Don't allow pets to stay outside except for short periods. Unless they are running the iditarod or course.

8. **Educate Children About Staying Warm (and some of**

you cowboys) -Young adults and children might not understand the additional risks of below-zero temperatures. Warning and educating them about the dangers could prevent frostbite and other injuries.
